# **BCA Photography Competition: Worthy Winners**

A total of 44 photographs from 11 senior and three junior entrants were judged by Jason Chadwick, Buxton Advertiser photographer, and Arthur Packham, BCA photographer, in early January.

Subjects were varied, covering landscape, flora and fauna to be found in BCA woodlands, and it was good to find that members (and some non-members) find BCA sites worthy of recording with their cameras.

The £50 prize for the overall Senior Section was won by Richard Knisely-Marpole with his picture of a juvenile dunnock, taken in Grin Wood (pictured below).





The Junior Section prize of £25 was awarded to Winnie Spence with a woodland scene in Corbar Wood (pictured above).

We hope prizes will be presented at the social event at the Palace Hotel on 10 April. We also plan to exhibit as many of the competition pictures as possible in the reception area at Poole's Cavern over the Easter holiday period. The display will show at least one picture from each entrant.

### A New Path for Corbar Wood

We are delighted to announce that the path linking the entrance near Corbar Road and the bottom of the steps up to the Cross has recently been resurfaced. No longer will people have to struggle through slippery mud, which made this a difficult route during wet weather.

We were fortunate that Tarmac Lime and Cement at Tunstead Quarry generously donated and delivered the stone needed for the resurfacing. The labour costs were supported by a £5,000 grant from the Derbyshire Dales and High Peak Accessibility Partnership.

Expert advice was given by Phil Beh-Mycock, who was responsible for many of the paths in the National Park. The work was carried out by Oak Tree Landscapes, a local firm who have done a number of schemes for BCA. Our thanks to all these for their help and advice.

We plan to continue work to improve our paths without destroying the essential character of our woodlands: our next project is on the main path in Grin Wood.

## **Invasive Plants and What to do with Them**

Peter Burgess-Allen, a member of BCA Woodlands group and a professional landscape gardener, has written a detailed guide to invasive plants and their eradication. Our thanks to Peter for this initiative.

The introduction is published here and the full article, with useful links, can be found on the BCA website.

The law concerning invasive nonnative plants in England & Wales has been updated recently to include over 50 species. Previously only Japanese Knotweed, Giant Hogweed and some seaweeds were included.

From April 2010 a number of commonly grown garden and pond plants are now listed in 'Schedule 9' of the Wildlife and Countryside Act – meaning that it's an offence to plant or 'otherwise cause them to grow' in the wild.

Confusingly, it is still legal to grow them in our gardens, and the law is unclear how natural seed dispersal will be interpreted. The best ploy, then, may be to avoid growing those species known to be a risk to native ecosystems and to be meticulous when composting plant material that could propagate i.e. seeds, corms, roots, stems.

The charity Plantlife has produced a guide to 'Gardening without harmful invasive plants', which suggests alternatives (tel: 01722 342755 for a copy).

BCA members might also be particularly vigilant in monitoring those Civic Association boundary zones close to residential properties.


He is passionate about the countryside and architecture, so is very supportive of the aims of the Civic Association.
